How does the author's use of literary devices help improve your understanding and appreciation of elements in the story? Each reflection about your selected passage must be a minimum of 1 paragraph.

I used the author's detailed description of the sounds that the dark shadows in the woods had made to help me predict that the creatures in Warden would not be as friendly as the ones from Sarah's village. The author's use of words like "shrill," "prickly," and "icy" helped me to imagine how Sarah might have felt and why she suddenly changed her mind about the journey. The author's description of the hazy and grey mist covering the woods made me very nervous for the travelers. I was relieved when Sarah changed their course of direction. I also learned to appreciate Sarah's role as a leader and protector.
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
2024 Summer Reading 8th Grade Social Studies

I will take the table up for a 10 point grade.** Be sure you have a minimum of 6 facts for <u>both sides</u> of the debate and that your facts come from <u>all parts</u> of the book (evidence that you read the entire book-- minimum of 2 facts from the beginning and middle and end). You do not have to fill in every blank, but more than six facts on each side is encouraged. If you need more blanks (but most don't), feel free to add them or print two tables. The evidence on each side does not have to be even in number.

Together, we will use this table to develop pieces of an argumentative paragraph. We will also study integration during Unit 5: Civil Rights Movement in the Spring.
